Bylaws Committee Report

Proposed Amendments to Bylaws for the 2021 MSAP Convention

Notice is hereby given of the proposed amendments to the governing documents to be considered by the delegates at the MSAP Convention on April 10, 2021. Advance notice of the proposed amendments allows members to consider the amendments and discuss them at unit meetings. Each amendment is presented in a formal manner and also in a three-column format. The three-column format is provided as a tool to assist the reader in visualizing the proposed amendment. It should be noted that the motion to be debated and on which the vote is taken is the formal statement of the amendment.

The Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee received the following eight amendments to the MSAP Bylaws from the MSAP Board of Directors. The Committee recommends that all eight amendments be adopted.

Ad Hoc Committee for Adding Value End of Year Report

Almost two years ago, President Vokes appointed an ad hoc committee to address the question *Are there ways in which our MSAP can add value to its members and others?* Darleen Harens, David Staehlin, President Vokes, and I met several times to discuss this issue. We set objectives, surveyed our members, and began an outreach to a community college student senate.

We met with a representative from that college and found them very interested in learning more about Robert's Rules. Plans were discussed for MSAP to provide a workshop at the student September 2020 Leadership Retreat. However, such plans and further meetings of the Ad Hoc committee have been on hold since March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Two of the committee's original goals were to increase attendance at our educational seminars, and to reach more community members. This was accomplished at the Annual Seminar held electronically January 29-30, 2021. Over 50 people attended at least one of four sessions with many attending all four. One participant attended from Quebec. While most were from Minnesota, many other states were represented, and the majority were non-members. The evaluations indicated that people are interested in many topics pertaining to parliamentary rules.

Adding value to the MSAP membership is important. This topic needs to continue to be addressed. Follow-up with the community college is needed. The planned workshop could be offered virtually like the Annual Seminar. Reaching more community members and college students will help to increase the awareness of MSAP and increase membership.

Parliamentary Authority

A Parliamentary Authority is a book of procedures and rules that help a deliberative assembly conduct meetings and business. The Authority covers rules that aren't addressed in an organization's bylaws or standing rules. MSAP uses RONR as it's Parliamentary Authority, but there are other such books.

One of the oldest Parliamentary Authority that is still in use today is the Jefferson's Manual. First published in 1801, President Thomas Jefferson based his work on parliamentary law and the House of Commons regulations. Today, the Jefferson's Manual is used in the United States House of Representatives

Many state legislatures use Mason's Manual. This Authority is geared to legislative bodies that meet daily in sessions or meetings that are public. Mason's Manual has been in existence since 1935 and is published by the National Conference of State Legislatures.

The American Institute of Parliamentarians Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure (AIPSC) was first published in 1950 by Alice Sturgis. It was called the Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure or Sturgis. The American Institute of Parliamentarians (AIP) changed the title in 2012 when they began publishing it. The AIPSC is used by many medical and dental association,

As of 2016, AIP also publishes Demeter's Manual of Parliamentary Law and Procedure. Demeter's is often used by labor unions in the United States.

As a parliamentarian assisting an assembly, it is important to be familiar with the Parliamentary Authority listed in their bylaws. It is highly recommended that all organizations list an Authority to address questions or issues that aren't specified in their bylaws or standing rules.

Annual Seminar

In a year with so many changes and challenges, our annual educational event, the Fall Seminar, fell victim to the pandemic. Instead, the Fall Seminar became a winter event. It was held January 29 and 30; it was open to the public, and it was held via Zoom. The subject matter was parliamentary basics, directed to an audience of nonprofit boards and members. An ambitious schedule was laid out, as follows:

Session 1 -- Order or chaos? Rules? What Rules? (Miriam Simmons, Ph.D., PRP) (46)

Session 2 – Rights and Responsibilities of Board Members (Jeanette N. Williams, PRP, CP-T) (48)

Session 3 —Managing a Marvelous Meeting: Maps, Minutes, \$ Money \$, Mutiny and Miscellany (Patricia Reymann, PRP and Ginny Altman, PRP) (41)

Session 4 --Who Let the Dogs Out--What is a Parliamentarian and Why Would You Need One? (Lucy Hamilton Johnson, PRP) (37)

Attendance for the sessions was capped at 50; registrants were required to respond to a survey. Attendees were not just from Minnesota but also from Florida, Illinois, Michigan, New York, Oregon, and Quebec. Attendance is noted above after the Session titles.

There was no fee to attend and there are minimal expenses (the cost of a monthly Zoom account, donated) but a significant contribution of instructor time. There is a significant amount of time required to collect and confirm registrations. If we want to do this in the future, we could collect fees if we use an event software that would make that feasible. A no-fee workshop means we get broad participation, but we also get no-shows.

Evaluation comments were quite positive, with people finding they learned much about meeting basics and how to be effective and fair in a meeting.

It can be – and often is -- a challenge to produce a seminar via Zoom; there were a few technical glitches, though participants seemed undisturbed by that. The same cannot be said for the co-hosts running the Zoom.

Nonetheless, it was a very positive experience for instructors and attendees, and we hope to continue to reach out to people with seminars on the basics of parliamentary procedure.
